another subject, I have received periodic complaints about our absentee policy. Absenteeism is a disruption to production, and therefore, a major cost to our product. Our absenteeism is now running close to 10%!

As a result of this, we are tightening our policies. Our policies are still more lenient than most other companies in the Denver area. Along with tightening the policies, however, we have established an Appeal Review Board so that we can respond to those circumstances that create a serious hardship.

One last note -- we are now at that time of the year where we approach the end of our "plan year" for the Profit Sharing Plan. Employees that terminate prior to the end of March are not considered as being in the Plan for this past year, and therefore, lose the annual 20% increase in vested amounts. In addition, this year we anticipate a significant increase in value of the Plan, calculated after March 3!. Except for some unkown catastrophe, everyone in the Plan on March 3! will njoy a major increase in their account -- ND THAT'S GOOD NEWS!!!

A LOOK AT THE PERSONNEL DEPT...

The purpose of this article is to give you a better idea of how the Personnel Dept. functions. Since personnel organization as recently changed, I would like to explain the present organization and major responsibilities.

For Plant I, our members are Rick Baldacci Emp. Mgr.; Nancy Crase, Pers. Asst.; Mary Lou Ray, Ind. Nurse; Joanie Schmidt, Receptionist; Patti Orazen, p.t. through the distributive education program; and Jack Wilson, Director of Administration.

At Plant II are Bill Thayer, Emp. Mgr.; Judy Walton, Pers. Asst.; Ann Haseltine, Ind. Nurse; & Marian Parker, Receptionist.

Some specific duties of the above people are as follows:

- Maintain employee records for hourly employees.
- 2) Handle reviews & administrative details for hourly wage program.
- 3) Recruitment, interviewing & screening all new employees.
- 4) Conducting exit interviews.
- 5) Administer employee insurance program.
- 6) Make hourly wage surveys & recommend changes to top management.
- 7) Evaluate jobs & write job descriptions with aid of supervisors.
- 8) Provide nursing care for all employees, handle workmen's compensation & maintain medical records.
- 9) Handle switchboard & greet Statitrol visitors.

In addition, our department has two other key people, Kathi Becker, Mgr., Pers. Relations & Jerry Cline, Training Specialist. Jerry, who is well known by most people in the production area, maintains files of available training classes and seminars; schedules these classes & also is responsible for updating & maintaining our personnel manuals.

The Manager of Personnel Relations job is a new position created at Duane's suggestion. Kathi's responsibilities are to maintain all salaried personnel records, handle major insurance problems & recreational & social activities. Together athi & I will handle salary administration, be responsible for job evaluation,

salary ranges & salary surveys. Kathi is presently developing an employee relations program designed to provide better services to all Statitrol employees.

My duties, in addition to managing the Personnel Dept. are in the corporate planning area & management development. I also handle corporate contributions & act as chairman of our social services committee. In general, I act as internal consultant for managers of Statitrol in personnel areas & other areas where my past experience might prove valuable.

To summarize, some of the following are what personnel is and what personnel is not:

PERSONNEL IS a service function as well as a staff function. PERSONNEL IS NOT a policy-making department. We may recommend policy & policy changes; we do publish policy, but actual policy decisions are made by the management of the company.

PERSONNEL DOES recruit, interview & screen prospective employees. PERSONNEL DOES NOT hire people, except within its own dept. The hiring decision is made by the supervisor. PERSONNEL DOES NOT terminate people. PERSONNEL DOES conduct exit interviews & advise terminating employees on insurance & other company matters.

PERSONNEL REPRESENTS the employees of Statitrol to corporate management. It also PRESENTS the policies & philosophy of Statitrol Corporation to the people.

DUTIES:

 Under general supervision, prepare, in smooth copy, form letters & other miscellaneous correspondence.

2) Some telephone contact requiring excellent phone etiquette & a pleasant personality.

3) Under general supervision, maintain office filing system.

4) Operate misc. office equipment.

QUALIFICATIONS:

1) High school diploma or equivalent.

2) Typing skills of 55-60 wpm.

3) General office procedures experience or training.

4) Experience or training in operation of various office machines, IBM electric typewriter, electronic calculator, xerox machine, etc.

Interested but not qualified? Please stop in and see me and we'll set up, thru evening Adult Education programs, the required courses you need to become qualified. Tuition aid is available in support of this type of program.

Also, if you are interested in a particular job, stop by the personnel dept. and check to see if there are any openings. If there are no openings at that time, you may make application for a future opening. Your application will be kept on file, by job title. When an opening occurs for that particular job, our employee applications will be considered for the job before any outside applications are taken.

PSCIPE OF THE MONTH: CARAMEL CORN


6 quarts popcorn (already popped)
