Transportation

Taxis are extremely expensive in Iceland, and ride-hailing services are banned by law. The most common forms of transportation will either be walking, or the public transportation system. Students will be provided with a monthly bus pass. The nearest bus stop is no more than a 10 minute walk from the housing. Daily commutes to sponsors will vary, but generally speaking, entail a 30-minute bus ride (at most) and less than one mile of walking.

Public Transport: The bus system here is very different from what we are accustomed to in Worcester, striking a more similar resemblance in reliability to the Boston subway network. This service dramatically shortens students travel time, allowing them to get further with some using it to even go hiking. The bus system also has taken steps to provide resources for certain groups of disabled people. For those with limited mobility, they provide extendable ramps to help connect raised platforms to the bus and have a section dedicated to fastening wheelchairs, however this requires that users should be able to embark and disembark on their own and fasten their wheelchair themselves. They also partner with a blind focused organization to provide free entry to members.
